Hence, there is no substantial change to the estimated expenditure or staffing requirement in 2009-10 for the public consultation exercise.

2. One directorate officer at D2 level, one Senior Administrative Officer and one Administrative Officer are responsible for handling tasks relating to the public consultation exercise. These posts are part of our current establishment and the officers will undertake the public consultation exercise in addition to other duties. Furthermore, four posts comprising one Senior Executive Officer, one Executive Officer II and two Assistant Clerical Officers will be created and will assist in handling the relevant tasks starting July 2009. We will also create one Personal Secretary II post in 2009-10 to provide assistance.

3. For budget planning purpose, we have set aside about \$5 million in 2009-10 for consulting the public on the two electoral methods for 2012.

#### Reply:

The Government's overall strategy in handling Taiwan affairs is to complement the improvement in cross-Strait relations, by enhancing our exchanges and interaction with Taiwan. As part of this strategy, we have decided to establish the high level inter-departmental Steering Committee on Enhancing Hong Kong – Taiwan Economic Relations ("the Steering Committee"), chaired by the Financial Secretary. The Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB) serves as the Secretariat and continues to be the bureau which sets and coordinates the HKSAR Government overall strategy in advancing Hong Kong – Taiwan relations. The Steering Committee also comprises members from other relevant bureaux and departments which have handled matters related to Taiwan. Therefore, there is no overlapping in work between the Steering Committee and CMAB. In fact, the establishment of the Steering Committee allows the Government to formulate the overall strategy and action plan on promoting our relations with Taiwan in a more coordinated fashion and on a broader scale.

2. In the last few years, CMAB has enhanced proactively exchanges between Hong Kong and Taiwan. In 2008-09, we allocated some \$1.5 million for such purpose. During the year, we have received prominent political figures, including representatives of the Straits Exchange Foundation; members of the Taiwan legislature, including those from Pan-Blue and Pan-Green camps; and officials at the county and city levels of Taiwan, including delegations led by the

Mayors of Taichung city and Kaohsiung city respectively. We have also organised visit programmes for Taiwan professional bodies, businessmen, students and academia. These initiatives have been helpful in enhancing understanding among different sectors in Taiwan on the implementation of "One Country, Two Systems" concept in Hong Kong.

- 3. We have sponsored local non-governmental organisations for organising six Hong Kong-Taiwan forum and seminars on topics of mutual interest to both places. We have also sponsored the organisation of study tours for students in Hong Kong, the Mainland and Taiwan. Over 500 students participated in the study tours to exchange views, enhance mutual understanding and build up their friendship.
- 4. In 2009-10, we will allocate additional resources to further enhance exchanges and co-operation with Taiwan. Our major work will include

  - (f) promoting exchanges between Hong Kong and Taiwan and facilitating relevant Taiwan visitors to understand the latest developments of Hong Kong and the implementation of "One Country, Two Systems".

The Government is committed to promoting public awareness of and respect for the rights of children. In 2008-09, major programmes in promoting children's rights include –

- (a) the Children's Rights Education Funding Scheme, which encourages community participation in promotion of public education on children's rights through providing funding for non-government organisations (NGOs) to carry out relevant projects. Seventeen NGOs have been sponsored in 2008-09;
- (b) sponsoring the Children's Council project, which is co-organised by three NGOs. The project aims at fostering children's interest in public affairs;
- (c) the Children's Rights Forum, which provides a direct channel for Government to exchange views on matters concerning children's welfare and development with children representatives and relevant NGOs; and
- (d) publication of a comic booklet to promote public awareness of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child.

2. As illustrated above, there is close co-operation between Government and relevant NGOs in promoting children's rights. The estimated expenditure for the relevant initiatives in 2008-09, excluding manpower resources, is about \$1.07 million. As regards manpower resources, promotion of the rights of children is an integral part of the Bureau's work. We do not have a separate breakdown of the manpower resources spent for the purpose.

Reply:

Major one-off events that took place in 2008 led to an upsurge of liaison and public relations activities in the year. These events include:

- (a) The Beijing 2008 Olympic Games hosted by China was a major international event. Hong Kong also co-hosted the Olympic and Paralympic Equestrian Events in Hong Kong. Various Olympic Games related publicity and commercial promotion activities were conducted in 2008 on the Mainland. The Mainland Offices had taken the opportunity to participate in these activities and step up their promotional and liaison work with the Mainland authorities, organisations and target audience. The Beijing 2008 Olympic Games was a one-off event and the situation in 2009 is expected to be different.
- (b) The Sichuan Wenchuan earthquake which occurred in May 2008 brought about heavy casualties and massive damage, with Sichuan being the hardest hit province. Immediately after the incident, the Mainland Offices,

particularly the Chengdu Economic and Trade Office and Beijing Office, had spared no efforts in liaising with the Central Authorities, Sichuan Government, local organisations in Sichuan, HKSAR Government bureaux/departments and Hong Kong non-government organisations etc. to assist in planning and implementing HKSAR's post-quake relief and reconstruction support work. There had been a surge in relevant liaison work in 2008.

2. The Mainland Offices will continue to spare no efforts in seeking and exploring suitable opportunities to further promote Hong Kong's commercial and public relations on the Mainland.

- 3. Of the 322 cases handled by the RRU in 2008, 310 were enquiries on the activities organised by the Unit and for information on public services. The remaining 12 were complaints alleging racial discrimination. Except for four complaint cases which are being processed, all the other 318 cases have been addressed and closed.

#### Reply:

At present, the Race Relations Unit (RRU) under the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB) is responsible for operating the enquiry and complaints hotline on race relations, as well as the Equal Opportunities (Race) Funding Scheme to promote race equality. After the full implementation of the Race Discrimination Ordinance (RDO), these duties will be taken over by the Equal Opportunities Commission (EOC). The annual allocation for the RRU (including staff cost) will be reduced by \$1.05 million in 2009-10 and the employment of a non-civil service contract Programme Officer will cease. The RRU will focus its work on supporting the Committee on the Promotion of Racial Harmony, providing support services for ethnic minorities (including overseeing the operation of the four support service centres for ethnic minorities) and coordinating the implementation of administrative guidelines for the promotion of racial equality.

2. An amount of \$1.05 million has been included in the 2009-10 Estimates for EOC to launch educational and publicity projects on racial equality on a recurrent basis. According to our plans, the RDO will commence full operation around mid-2009, following the adoption of the Code of Practice on Employment and enactment of the relevant subsidiary legislation. Our intention is to review together with the EOC their requirement for additional resources to implement the RDO from that point onward. We have set aside an amount of around \$4 million to facilitate the enforcement of the RDO. However, the funding allocation to EOC is subject to the review over the next few months.

The Mainland Offices adopt a multi-pronged approach in representing and promoting Hong Kong's trade and commercial interests in the Mainland by organising trade missions, seminars and exhibitions for Hong Kong investors, as well as collecting and disseminating information on business information in the Mainland (including those relating to new laws and policies) to facilitate Hong Kong investors to understand the local business environment and establish their network in the Mainland. They also proactively approach Hong Kong investors and follow up issues of common concerns through appropriate channels. For example, in 2008, the Mainland Offices organised trade missions to Zhejiang, Yunnan and to the northern provinces of Heilongjiang, Jilin and Liaoning etc. to enhance mutual understanding on latest developments as well as on business opportunities. Seminars and forums were also organised on areas of interest to Hong Kong investors, including CEPA, processing trade and related policies, Mainland taxation, impact of financial tsunami to Hong Kong enterprises in the Mainland etc. Taking the opportunity of the Beijing 2008 Olympic Games, particularly our role as host to the Olympic and Paralympic Equestrian Events, exhibitions were held in 23 major trade fairs/expos/events in various Mainland cities.

2. Another major role of the Mainland Offices is to promote inward investment into Hong Kong. The Investment Promotion Divisions of the Mainland Offices, working alongside with Invest Hong Kong, identify potential Mainland companies in the areas that they cover; proactively approach and visit the companies identified to encourage them to invest in Hong Kong; provide free one-stop information and consultation services; and organise incoming visits and

help identify and match Mainland potential investors with business partners in Hong Kong. In 2008, the Mainland Offices have facilitated visits by government officials to promote investment in Mainland cities and organised study missions for Mainland officials and enterprises to visit Hong Kong, as well as organised seminars to promote the advantages of investing in Hong Kong.

3. The Mainland Offices will continue to spare no efforts in further promoting Hong Kong's economic and trade interests in the Mainland and promoting investment in Hong Kong through the existing approach. Since the Mainland Offices cover a range of functions including liaison, public relations, economic and trade as well as investment promotion matters by adopting an integrated approach, it is not possible to quantify precisely the amount of resources and manpower to be allocated to each function. The provision earmarked for liaison, economic and trade, and investment promotion affairs under programme (3) for 2009-10 is about \$100 million. The establishment of the Mainland Offices (excluding the Immigration Divisions of the Beijing Office and Guangdong ETO) for taking forward these functions comprises 30 Hong Kong based officers who are supported by 65 locally-engaged staff.

The Building Services Engineer will provide professional input for the design and maintenance of the building services installations at the Hong Kong Pavilion and the Urban Best Practice Area Exhibition. The Executive Officer I will provide administrative and executive support.

- 2. The remaining 12 posts will be responsible for various duties as set out below -

- (a) In setting the number of self-initiated investigations at eight for 2009, the Office of the Privacy Commissioner for Personal Data (PCPD) has taken into account the actual experience of conducting such investigations in 2008 as well as the resources required.
- (b) The eight self-initiated investigation cases in 2008 were handled by the following staff (excluding input from supporting staff and senior supervisory officers) as part of their duties:
  - 1 Chief Privacy Compliance Officer
  - 1 Senior Personal Data Officer
  - 1 Personal Data Officer
  - 1 Assistant Personal Data Officer

Since the work involved is part of the staff's duties, there is no separate breakdown on the actual expenditure incurred. It is envisaged that similar manpower input would be required to undertake the projected eight self-initiated investigations in 2009. In addition, with the creation of a Chief Information Technology Officer post in 2009-10, the officer is also expected to devote some of his time to render support to the investigation process on the information technology front.

(c) Each staff member may spend a different amount of time (ranging from a few days to a few weeks) in handling different investigations. This varies considerably, depending on the complexity of the case and the involvement needed from each officer. There is no separate breakdown to show the resources or expenditure actually incurred in each of the cases in 2008.

It also provides guidance on the long-term development between the PRD Region and Hong Kong/Macao. The Administration welcomes the launch of the Outline and attaches great importance to it.

2. One of the aims of the Mainland Offices in the economic and trade area is to represent and promote Hong Kong's trade and commercial interests in the Mainland. The Mainland Offices adopt a multi-pronged approach in taking this forward. They do so by organising trade missions, seminars and exhibitions for Hong Kong investors, as well as collecting and disseminating information on business information in the Mainland (including those relating to new laws and policies) to facilitate Hong Kong investors to understand the local business environment and establish their network in the Mainland. They also proactively approach Hong Kong investors and follow up issues of common concerns through appropriate channels. Seminars and forums were also organised on areas of

interest to Hong Kong investors, including CEPA, processing trade and related policies, Mainland taxation, impact of financial tsunami to Hong Kong enterprises in the Mainland etc.

3. Implementation of the various initiatives under the Outline straddles across the policy areas of many policy bureaux. The Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau will continue to co-ordinate efforts in this regard to ensure the smooth implementation of the Outline. In this regard, the Mainland Offices will closely monitor developments. The Hong Kong Economic and Trade Offices (Mainland) (ETOs Mainland) are growing in importance with closer ties between Hong Kong and the Mainland in terms of economy and trade, daily exchanges and transport. Are there any plans to put in more resources to strengthen the manpower and expand the scope of services of these Offices or even to consider cooperation with some Hong Kong civic organisations which have Mainland offices to provide better services to Hong Kong people?

Subhead (No. & title):

Asked by: Hon. WONG Ting-kwong

Reply:

Among its major functions, the Mainland Offices represent and promote Hong Kong's trade and commercial interests in the Mainland; and promote and encourage Mainland enterprises to invest in Hong Kong. They also render assistance to Hong Kong residents who have encountered difficulties in the Mainland, including referral of cases relating to business and trade disputes to relevant Mainland authorities for follow-up actions; and providing practicable assistance to Hong Kong residents in distress.

2. The Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau, in conjunction with the Mainland Offices, regularly review the services provided by the latter and the manpower required based on the actual circumstances and operational needs. Where appropriate, the Mainland Offices will cooperate with organisations providing services in the Mainland for individual projects/events. For example, with a view to enhancing communication between Hong Kong investors in the Mainland with the local authorities, the Beijing Office and Shanghai ETO have co-organised seminars with the Hong Kong Chamber of Commerce in China, providing Hong Kong businesses the opportunity to express their concerns and have direct dialogue with relevant local authorities. The Shanghai ETO has also co-organised with the Hong Kong Logistics Association and the Hong Kong Institute of Bankers in arranging trade and study missions to Zhejiang and Shanghai respectively to promote understanding of the latest developments and

business opportunities concerning both sectors. Separately, in conjunction with the Hong Kong Chamber of Commerce in China, the Chinese General Chamber of Commerce, the Chinese Manufacturers' Association of Hong Kong and other organizations, the Guangdong ETO has organized a series of seminars on Mainland processing trade policy, tax laws and other subjects of interest to Hong Kong investors in the Mainland. Also, the Hong Kong Productivity Council (HKPC) has embarked on a programme to assist and encourage Hong Kong-owned factories in Guangdong to adopt cleaner production technologies and processes to improve the regional environment. The Guangdong ETO has assisted HKPC in liaison with relevant local authorities and promoting relevant seminars and organising study missions.

- 3. On manpower, the Guangdong ETO created one locally-engaged staff post in 2008-09 to handle additional work arising from the substantial increase of visits and other promotional events in the five provinces/region under its purview. In connection with the increased liaison work required of the Chengdu ETO to take forward HKSAR's initiatives in support of reconstruction in Sichuan, four time-limited locally-engaged staff posts have recently been created to provide the necessary support in Sichuan.
- 4. In 2009-10, the estimate for the Mainland Offices under Programme (3) is \$121 million, representing an increase of 4.6% compared with the revised estimate of 2008-09. We will continue to review the situation and if necessary, revise the related resource requirement in accordance with established procedures.

On 1 December 2008, we issued an open invitation for non-governmental organisations (NGOs) to apply for funding to establish and operate four regional support service centres for ethnic minorities in Hong Kong. By close of the application on 12 January 2009, a total of 22 applications from 16 NGOs were received.

- 2. We are now in the process of selecting the most suitable applicants to run the centres, and will announce the outcome soon. The centres are expected to commence their services in mid-2009.
- 3. Of the \$8 million one-off provision earmarked for the setting up of the centres, up to \$3.5 million is reserved for the centre providing telephone interpretation service and other support services, and up to \$1.5 million is reserved for each of the other three centres. The one-off provision would cover items such as the fitting out of the premises, purchase of office equipment, installation of facilities required for the provision of services and manpower for pre-service training and preparation.

- 4. Of the \$16 million recurrent provision for the operation of the four centres, up to \$7 million is earmarked for the operating expense of the centre providing telephone interpretation service, and up to \$3 million is earmarked for each of the other three centres.
- 5. The actual setting up and operation expenses and staffing arrangements will be dependent on the proposals of the organisations chosen to operate the centres.

This includes promotion and public education on children's rights, racial equality and harmony and equal opportunities for people of different sexual orientation and transgendered persons as well as sponsorship to NGOs for relevant activities.
- 3. The expenditure incurred on promoting racial equality in 2004-05, 2005-06, 2006-07, 2007-08 and 2008-09 (estimated) is \$5.76 million, \$8.16 million, \$10.34 million, \$6.39 million and \$9.31 million respectively.

4. There was a fluctuation in the 2006-07 and 2007-08 expenditure figures on promoting the rights of the individual and the breakdown on promoting racial equality. We are fully committed to the implementation of the Race Discrimination Ordinance (RDO). An amount of \$1.05 million has been included in the 2009-10 estimate for the Equal Opportunities Commission (EOC) to launch educational and publicity projects on racial equality on a recurrent basis. According to our plans, the RDO will commence full operation around mid-2009, following the adoption of the Code of Practice on Employment and enactment of the relevant subsidiary legislation. Our intention is to review together with the EOC their requirement for additional resources to implement the RDO from that point onward. We have set aside an amount of around \$4 million to facilitate the enforcement of the RDO. However, the funding allocation to EOC is subject to the review over the next few months.

2. In 2008-09, there was a one-off provision of \$1 million for publicity and promotion of equal opportunities especially in the light of the race discrimination legislation, and a capital subvention of \$0.48 million for the production of training materials which was completed in 2008-09. Since these amounts are for 2008-09

only, and the 2009-10 estimate for the EOC has not yet taken into account the additional funding to be allocated for enforcement of the RDO, the 2009-10 estimate is slightly lower than the 2008-09 revised estimate.

A provision of \$3 million is included in the 2008-09 revised estimate as part of the setting up cost and about \$5 million in the 2009-10 estimate as the remaining part of the setting up cost. No provision out of the \$8 million funding is reserved in subsequent years.

2. A provision of \$16 million is also included in the 2009-10 estimate for funding the annual recurrent expenditure of the four centres including staff costs, rental of premises, operational expenses for organising activities and other administrative expenditure. Similar recurrent provisions will need to be made in subsequent years to finance the operation of these centres.

3. The statement made in the 2008-09 budget speech about earmarking \$16 million for operating expenses of the four centres and \$8 million to subsidise the start-up cost conveyed our policy of establishing these four centres to support ethnic minorities. In practice, since we plan to provide the four centres with part of the start-up cost in 2008-09, the amount of \$8 million has not been expended in full in 2008-09. The remaining part of the setting up cost and the annual operating cost will be incurred in 2009-10. No additional provision is being made for the same purpose in 2009-10.

The Government has been taking measures to promote the rights of individuals through various means and channels, including education at schools, community activities, collaboration with non-government organisations and publicity activities. The commitment of \$750,000 for the promotion of human rights under subhead 700 General Non-recurrent accounts for a small part of the overall expenditure on the promotion of human rights.

2. Of this amount, \$337,000 was incurred before 2004-05 for promotion of human rights including publicity on the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR) and the International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights for members of the public. No expenditure was incurred for 2004-05 to 2007-08. In 2008-09, the estimated expenditure under this subhead is \$263,000, which covers the design and printing cost of two comic booklets on ICCPR and the Convention on the Rights of the Child by the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau. The booklets target particularly at children.

PCPD is therefore unable to accede to a request for specific information of an investigation. That said, as the data users in respect of seven of these eight self-initiated investigations have already disclosed details of the cases to the public, the requested information in respect of these seven cases are provided at the Annex. In respect of the remaining case, the PCPD could only provide generalised information on the case (see Case 2 at Annex).

2. In 2008, the PCPD deployed four officers (Chief Privacy Compliance Officer, Senior Personal Data Officer, Personal Data Officer and Assistant Personal Data Officer) to handle these eight self-initiated compliance investigations. Since the investigation work involved is part of the staff's duties, there is no separate breakdown on the actual expenditure incurred.

- 1 Corporate Communications Manager
- 2 Corporate Communications Officers
- 2. A team of 12 staff members is responsible for conducting investigations into complaints and their respective ranks are as follows:
  - 1 Chief Personal Data Officer (overall supervision)
  - 2 Senior Personal Data Officers
  - 5 Personal Data Officers
  - 4 Assistant Personal Data Officers

In 2008, the PCPD conducted investigations into 946 complaints. On average, each of the 11 case officers responsible for conducting investigations handled 86 complaints in a year.

- 3. Compliance enforcement work, including self-initiated investigations, inspections of personal data systems, compliance checks, applications for consent to carry out matching procedures as well as handling of public enquiries, is separately handled by the Compliance Division of the PCPD which comprises eight officers. Of these eight officers, the following officers are responsible for carrying out self-initiated investigations and inspections of personal data systems, apart from other compliance duties:
  - 1 Chief Privacy Compliance Officer
  - 1 Senior Personal Data Officer
  - 1 Personal Data Officer
  - 1 Assistant Personal Data Officer
- 4. In 2008, the PCPD conducted eight self-initiated investigations and one inspection of the patients' personal data system of a hospital of the Hospital Authority. Since the self-initiated investigations were part of the staff's duties and over half of the workforce of the PCPD was deployed to conduct the inspection which took about two months to complete, there is no separate breakdown on the average case output figures on self-initiated investigations and inspections.

#### Reply:

The Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau coordinates the government's liaison with Taiwan organisations in Hong Kong under the framework of the "One China" policy and "Qian's Seven Principles". In 2008-09, we continued to strengthen our liaison and relations with the Taiwanese business sector, trade associations, fraternity associations and other Taiwan organisations in Hong Kong. In addition, we supported exchanges between Hong Kong and Taiwan with a view to enhancing understanding of the latest development of Hong Kong and the implementation of "One Country, Two Systems" through, among other means, inviting Taiwan personalities from different sectors to visit Hong Kong, and briefing relevant incoming Taiwan visitors.

2. In 2008-09, we have proactively liaised with a wide spectrum of sectors in Taiwan. We have received members of the Taiwan legislature, including those from Pan-Blue and Pan-Green camps. We have received prominent political figures, including representatives of the Straits Exchange Foundation. We have received officials at the county and city levels of Taiwan, including delegations led by the Mayors of Taichung city and Kaohsiung city respectively, the Taipei city council and other public institutions. We have also organised visit programmes for Taiwan professional bodies, businessmen, students and academia. These initiatives have been helpful in enhancing understanding among different sectors in

Taiwan on the implementation of "One Country, Two Systems" concept in Hong Kong.

- 3. We have sponsored local non-governmental organisations for organising six Hong Kong-Taiwan forum and seminars on topics of mutual interest to both places. We have also sponsored the organisation of study tours for students in Hong Kong, the Mainland and Taiwan. Over 500 students participated in the study tours to exchange views, enhance mutual understanding and build up their friendship.
- 4. In 2009-10, we will continue to enhance exchanges and co-operation with Taiwan. Our major work will include
  - (a) organising the first Hong Kong-Taiwan Inter-City Forum with Taichung city to discuss issues related to economic and trade development, tourism etc;
  - (b) sponsoring forum, seminar and related activities organised by non-governmental organisations to promote Hong Kong-Taiwan exchanges;
  - (c) inviting Taiwan personalities from different sectors to visit Hong Kong and briefing them on the latest developments of Hong Kong and the implementation of "One Country, Two Systems";
  - (d) liaising with Taiwan organisations in Hong Kong on matters concerning the relations between Hong Kong and Taiwan;
  - (e) advising and assisting other bureaux and departments on cultural, trade and economic exchanges with Taiwan; and
  - (f) promoting exchanges between Hong Kong and Taiwan and facilitating relevant Taiwan visitors to understand the latest developments of Hong Kong and the implementation of "One Country, Two Systems".

The Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB) is committed to promoting regional co-operation with the Mainland, as well as developing and maintaining a good working relationship with the Government of the Macao Special Administrative Region. Our replies to the two parts of the question are as follows -

(a) In 2008, the above efforts were pursued in the form of meetings, visits, exchanging and sharing of information under the co-operation frameworks of Pan-Pearl River Delta Regional Co-operation Framework Agreement, Hong Kong/Guangdong Co-operation Joint Conference, Hong Kong/Shenzhen Co-operation Meeting, Hong Kong/Shanghai and Hong Kong/Beijing Economic and Trade Co-operation Conferences and Hong Kong/Macao Co-operation Meeting.

CMAB has been, via the above platforms, co-ordinating efforts in pushing forward co-operation on areas of economics and trade, environmental protection, innovation and technology, as well as major cross-boundary infrastructural projects and boundary control points, etc. Major initiatives

under these areas include expanding the Closer Economic Partnership Arrangement; supporting Hong Kong-invested enterprises in restructuring and upgrading of processing trade as well as assisting the small and medium-sized enterprises; implementing the Pearl River Delta Regional Air Quality Management Plan and Cleaner Production Partnership Programme; enhancing the Guangdong/Hong Kong Technology Co-operation Funding Scheme; taking forward collaboration initiatives under the Shenzhen/Hong Kong Innovation Circle framework, pressing ahead with the Hong Kong-Zhuhai-Macao Bridge, Guangzhou-Shenzhen-Hong Kong Express Rail Link and Liantang/Heung Yuen Wai Boundary Control Point; fostering closer co-operation between the two airports in Hong Kong and Shenzhen; and developing the Lok Ma Chau Loop, etc.

(b) In the coming year, we will continue with the above efforts in promoting regional co-operation with the Mainland, as well as enhancing our co-operation with the Macao Special Administrative Region. We will also push forward co-operation with Guangdong and Macao in implementing the "Outline of the Plan for the Reform and Development of the Pearl River Delta", which provides guidance on the long-term development of Hong Kong, Guangdong and Macao. We have earmarked about \$3.89 million in 2009-10 for the above purposes. This amount represents the direct expenditure which is expected to be incurred in relation to various conferences, visits and similar events. In addition, our four Mainland Offices have financial provision for undertaking promotions to further strengthen our relations with the respective provinces and municipalities.

- 2. For cases relating to immigration and personal safety matters, assistance rendered by the Immigration Divisions of Beijing Office and Guangdong Economic and Trade Office usually covers the following scenarios:
- (a) <u>Loss of travel documents or monies</u>: Verifying the identity of the concerned Hong Kong residents who have lost their travel documents and facilitating their early return to Hong Kong. The Divisions will also contact the family of the concerned Hong Kong residents where necessary.
- (b) <u>Accidents, injuries and decease cases</u>: Providing practicable assistance to the concerned assistance seekers and their families, including:
  - (i) notifying, as soon as possible, relatives of the parties concerned;
  - (ii) contacting family/travel agencies to arrange for the early return of the injured persons to Hong Kong for treatment;
  - (iii) facilitating the entry of the injured persons at control points back to Hong Kong;
  - (iv) if medical treatment is required in the Mainland, and where practicable, providing information on medical services available for reference; and
  - (v) assisting family members of the deceased in completing the application procedures for death certificates and for transporting the bodies back to Hong Kong.
- (c) Arrest or Detention: The Divisions will gather details of the case from the assistance seekers (usually family members of the concerned Hong Kong resident) and explain to them the relevant Mainland laws, regulations and procedures for criminal cases under different stages of investigation, prosecution, trial or imprisonment, etc. They will also advise the assistance seekers that they may appoint Mainland lawyers as their legal representatives. Where required, the Divisions can provide the assistance seekers with the relevant contact details of law societies in the concerned provinces/region under its coverage, so that the assistance seekers may consider seeking appropriate legal representation. At the request of the assistance seekers, the Divisions will pass on and reflect their views and requests to the relevant Mainland authorities and provide them with relevant information for reference (e.g. the rights and obligations of a person under detention) according to the development of the case.
- 3. For other cases (items 4-7 in the Table at paragraph 1 above), the Mainland Offices would usually refer them to the relevant Mainland authorities. However, some cases, such as those under judicial proceedings or involving private contractual disputes, or assistance sought by non-Hong Kong residents, might fall outside the scope of the established referral mechanism. The Mainland Offices

could not process the requests further and would carefully explain the situation to the assistance seekers.

The establishment of the Beijing Office for 2009-10 will comprise 3 directorate officers (i.e.1 Administrative Officer Staff Grade A, 1 Administrative Officer Staff Grade B1 and 1 Administrative Officer Staff Grade C) and 13 non-directorate officers (i.e. 1 Senior Administrative Officer, 1 Principal Trade Officer, 2 Trade Officers, 1 Principal Immigration Officer, 1 Chief Immigration Officer, 3 Immigration Officers, 1 Chief Information Officer, 1 Assistant Information Officer, 1 Executive Officer I and 1 Senior Personal Secretary). The office will be supported by 26 locally-engaged staff to assist in various duties.

- 2. The establishment of the Guangdong ETO for 2009-10 will comprise 1 directorate officer (Administrative Officer Staff Grade B) and 11 non-directorate officers (i.e. 1 Senior Administrative Officer, 2 Principal Trade Officers, 3 Trade Officers, 1 Principal Immigration Officer, 1 Chief Immigration Officer, 2 Immigration Officers and 1 Principal Information Officer). The office will be supported by 20 locally-engaged staff to assist in various duties.
- 3. The establishment of the Shanghai ETO in 2009-10 will comprise 1 directorate officer (Administrative Officer Staff Grade B) and 5 non-directorate

officers (i.e. 1 Senior Administrative Officer, 1 Principal Trade Officer, 2 Trade Officers and 1 Senior Information Officer). The office will be supported by 11 locally-engaged staff to assist in various duties.

- 4. The establishment of the Chengdu ETO in 2009-10 will comprise 1 directorate officer (Administrative Officer Staff Grade C) and 4 non-directorate officers (i.e. 1 Senior Administrative Officer, 2 Trade Officers and 1 Senior Information Officer). The office will be supported by 14 locally-engaged staff to assist in various duties.
- 5. Since its establishment in 2002, the Guangdong ETO has been maintaining close contact and cooperation with Mainland authorities and organisations on the overall developments and commercial relationships between Hong Kong and provinces/region under its coverage. Following the promulgation of the Outline of the Plan for the Reform and Development of the Pearl River Delta (2008-2020) (the Outline), Guangdong ETO will step up its liaison with the Mainland authorities and organisations, so as to strengthen communication and enhance understanding of the opportunities brought about by the implementation of the Outline. The extra work involved will be absorbed by the existing manpower of the Guangdong ETO.
- 6. The World Exposition 2010 Shanghai China (Shanghai Expo) will be held in Shanghai in May October 2010. HKSAR's participation in the event covers a wide range of large-scale activities, including the construction and operation of a stand-alone Hong Kong Pavilion, mounting and running of a dedicated exhibition in the Urban Best Practice Area Exhibition, organisation and presentation of a series of cultural performances and promotional activities, as well as the development of an Online Hong Kong Pavilion. Shanghai ETO has been providing support in the coordination of planning and implementation of HKSAR's participation in the Shanghai Expo. It will continue to do so with the existing staffing provision.

The increase is mainly due to increased provisions for personal emoluments and personnel-related expenses, as well as for general departmental expenses in the Mainland Offices. Please provide details of and reasons for the increase.

#### Reply:

There is a \$5.3 million (4.6%) increase in the provision for Programme (3) for 2009-10 compared with the revised estimate for 2008-09. This is mainly due to the following factors:

- (i) In 2008-09, the revised estimate for personal emolument of the Mainland Offices is lower than the original estimate, due mainly to manpower deployment reasons, such as temporary time gap between postings, and engagement of locally-engaged staff pending deployment of suitable Hong Kong based officers. Full year provision based on the Mainland Offices' establishment is made for 2009-10, accounting for about \$1.4 million increase in the personal emolument expenditure compared with that of 2008-09.
- (ii) The Shanghai Economic and Trade Office and Chengdu Economic and Trade Office were set up in 2006. In the same year, the Investment Promotion Unit and Immigration Division were set up in the Beijing Office and Guangdong ETO respectively. A number of Hong Kong based officers posted to these Mainland Offices will return to Hong Kong in 2009 upon completion of their tenure of posting. Provision has been made for the related allowances for posting these officers back to Hong Kong and posting their

- successors to the Mainland Offices. The related net increase of provision for this purpose is about \$1.6 million.
- (iii) Taking into account the level of activities of the Mainland Offices, and possible exchange rate fluctuation of Renmenbi, the provision for Departmental Expenses and Other Charges for the Mainland Offices is increased by about \$2.3 million.

#### Reply:

The "Outline of the Plan for the Reform and Development of the Pearl River Delta" (the Outline) was promulgated by the National Development and Reform Commission on 8 January 2009. It reaffirms the major achievements made by the Pearl River Delta Region (PRD Region) in the 30 years of the nation's reform, opening up and development. It also provides guidance on the long-term development between the PRD Region and Hong Kong/Macao. The Administration welcomes the launch of the Outline and attaches great importance to it.

- 2. In less than two weeks upon its publication, Hong Kong and Guangdong held a working meeting on 21 January 2009 to discuss the implementation of the Outline. Within about one month, a liaison and co-ordinating meeting was also held between Hong Kong, Guangdong and Macao on 19 February 2009 to confirm the co-operation details for the implementation of the Outline. The three Governments also agreed to convene liaison and co-ordinating meeting in a timely manner, so as to discuss strategies with the relevant parties.
- 3. To further enhance co-operation between Guangdong and Hong Kong, both sides agreed to push forward co-operation on four major areas, including infrastructure projects, as well as industrial, environmental and educational

co-operation; to jointly formulate regional co-operation plans on two specialised topics (i.e. "jointly building a high-quality living community" and "infrastructure construction"); and to draw up a framework agreement for Hong Kong-Guangdong co-operation.

- 4. The Administration has been following up the above initiatives actively. As far as the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region is concerned, these initiatives straddle across the policy areas of many bureaux. The Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau will continue to co-ordinate efforts in this regard to ensure the smooth implementation of the Outline. The Guangdong Economic and Trade Office (GDETO) will also step up its liaison with the relevant Mainland authorities and related organisations, so as to strengthen communication and enhance understanding of the Outline.
- 5. In 2009-10, we have earmarked about \$1.45 million under Programme (2) for the promotion of co-operation among Hong Kong, Guangdong and Macao. This amount covers the direct expenditure to be incurred in respect of various conferences, seminars and similar events. However, the Bureau as a whole and the GDETO will have staff and other resources which will be involved in the implementation of the Outline.

During 2008-09, 1 Senior Executive Officer post was redeployed to the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB) in August 2008 to assist in coping with additional administrative work following the merger of the BJO's expenditure head with that of CMAB. #### Reply:

Major one-off events that took place in 2008 led to an upsurge of liaison and public relations activities in the year. These events include:

- (a) The major international event of Beijing 2008 Olympic Games hosted by China was held in Beijing in 2008. Hong Kong also co-hosted the Olympic and Paralympic Equestrian Events in Hong Kong. Various Olympic Games related publicity and commercial promotion activities were conducted in 2008 on the Mainland. The Mainland Offices had taken the opportunity to participate in these activities and step up their promotional and liaison work with the Mainland authorities, organisations and target audience. The Beijing 2008 Olympic Games was a one-off event, and the situation in 2009 is expected to be different.
- (b) The Sichuan earthquake which occurred in May 2008 brought about heavy casualties and massive damage, with Sichuan being the hardest hit province. Immediately after the incident, the Mainland Offices, particularly the Chengdu Economic and Trade Office and Beijing Office, had spared no efforts in liaising with the Central Authorities, Sichuan Government, local organisations in Sichuan, HKSAR Government bureaux/departments and Hong Kong non-government organisations etc. to assist in planning and implementing HKSAR's post-quake relief and

reconstruction support work. There had been a surge in relevant liaison work in 2008.

2. The Mainland Offices will continue to spare no efforts in seeking and exploring suitable opportunities to further promote Hong Kong's commercial and public relations on the Mainland.

A major role of the Mainland Offices is to promote Hong Kong's many advantages as a trade, investment and business hub in the region, and to attract Mainland enterprises to invest in Hong Kong. The number of projects pursued refers to the number of investment projects handled, for which assistance and facilitation services have been provided to the companies concerned in setting up or expanding their operation in Hong Kong. The Investment Promotion Divisions of the Mainland Offices will continue to identify potential Mainland companies in the areas that they cover; proactively approach and visit the companies identified to encourage them to invest in Hong Kong; provide free, one-stop information and consultation services; and help identify and match Mainland potential investors with business partners in Hong Kong.

2. The estimated number of projects to be pursued by the four Mainland Offices in 2009 is 220, representing a slight increase of 1.4% compared with the 217 projects pursued in 2008. The estimation has taken into account the actual operational experience and manpower conditions of the Mainland Offices.

3. The Mainland Offices will continue to work together with Invest Hong Kong to proactively attract Mainland companies to invest in Hong Kong. The estimated number of projects to be completed in 2009 is 54, the same as that for 2008.

#### Reply:

Under Secretaries are responsible principally for assisting the Secretaries in undertaking the full range of political work, including the handling of Legislative Council (LegCo) business, and deputising for the Secretaries during the latter's temporary absence. For instance, with effect from the 2008-09 legislation session, Secretaries or Under Secretaries would normally attend regular meetings of the relevant LegCo panel. These are important forums for the Government to explain its policies and to secure support for its initiatives. As part of their role in reaching out to the community, Under Secretaries chaired the district forums on the 2008-09 Policy Address.

2. Political Assistants are responsible principally for providing political support and input to the Secretaries and the Under Secretaries, and conducting the necessary political liaison at the instruction of the Secretaries and the Under Secretaries, including the liaison with the media and various stakeholders. Upon assuming office, the Political Assistants have provided advice from the political perspective on, for instance, the need for lobbying political parties / groups and the handling of invitations and correspondence from political parties / groups. They have also monitored views from interest groups and the general public on policy issues concerned and assessed the political implications.

- 3. The appointment of Under Secretaries and Political Assistants has strengthened the support to the Secretaries in undertaking political work, communicating with the LegCo and other stakeholders, such as District Councils, political parties/ groups, non-government organisations, district personalities as well as business, professional and other bodies, and explaining Government policies to the media and the public at large.
- 4. The system is now more complete than before and is serving its functions. The Government has no current plan to review the system.
- 5. Regarding the filling of the outstanding positions of Under Secretaries and Political Assistants, our consistent position is that, if there are suitable candidates, such positions will be filled. If necessary, this could be done in phases.

#### Reply:

The Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau coordinates the government's liaison with Taiwan organisations in Hong Kong under the framework of the "One China" policy and "Qian's Seven Principles". In 2008-09, we continued to strengthen our liaison and relations with the Taiwanese business sector, trade associations, fraternity associations and other Taiwan organisations in Hong Kong. In addition, we supported exchanges between Hong Kong and Taiwan with a view to enhancing understanding of the latest development of Hong Kong and the implementation of "One Country, Two Systems" through, among other means, inviting Taiwan personalities from different sectors to visit Hong Kong, and briefing relevant incoming Taiwan visitors.

- 2. In the last few years, CMAB has enhanced proactively exchanges between Hong Kong and Taiwan. In 2008-09, we allocated about \$1.5 million for such purpose. During the year, we have received prominent political figures, including representatives of the Straits Exchange Foundation; members of the Taiwan legislature, including those from Pan-Blue and Pan-Green camps; and officials at the county and city levels of Taiwan, including delegations led by the Mayors of Taichung city and Kaohsiung city respectively.
- 3. We have also organised visit programmes for Taiwan professional bodies, businessmen, students and academia. These initiatives have been helpful in enhancing understanding among different sectors in Taiwan on the implementation

of "One Country, Two Systems" concept in Hong Kong. About \$0.25 million were provided for this purpose.

4. We have sponsored local non-governmental organisations for organising six Hong Kong-Taiwan forum and seminars on topics of mutual interests to both places. We have also sponsored the organisation of study tours among students in Hong Kong, the Mainland and Taiwan. Over 500 students participated in the study tours to exchange views, enhance mutual understanding and build up their friendship. About \$1.22 million were provided for this purpose.

The Basic Law Promotion Steering Committee (BLPSC) and its working groups, namely local community; teachers and students; civil servants; industrial, commercial and professional sectors; and overseas community, had seven meetings in 2008-09. All activities deliberated by the working groups were implemented by the relevant government bureaux/departments. As such, the expenditure involved were borne by the bureaux/departments concerned.

- 2. The Government has been promoting the Basic Law through civic education, school education and training for civil servants. Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB) is the policy bureau responsible for the promotional efforts, with Home Affairs Bureau, Education Bureau and Civil Service Bureau organising related promotional activities in their respective sectors.
- 3. The Government as a whole has set aside a provision of some \$20 million for the promotion of Basic Law in 2008-09. CMAB alone has set aside a provision of \$16 million for the purpose. We have organised and sponsored over 20 Basic Law promotional activities using the following three promotional strategies:
  - firstly, we used the electronic media as our key publicity channel to introduce the more macro and concrete aspects of the Basic Law to the general public, including the historical background and the drafting of the Basic Law, as well as the constitutional set up of the "One Country, Two Systems". Some \$6.6 million were provided for the production of TV

drama, TV documentary, Announcement of Public Interest, game show and radio quiz show;

- secondly, we enhanced public awareness and understanding of the Basic Law in a lively and interactive manner through promotional activities at district levels, such as roving shows and carnivals. About \$5.1 million were provided for the purpose; and
- thirdly, we have strengthened the co-operation with community organisations in organising promotional activities, such as seminars and competitions, in order to reach a wider audience through their extensive community networks. We have offered about \$3.3 million sponsorship.

Close contacts and communication are made on matters of mutual concern, such as official exchanges and visits between Hong Kong and the Mainland, new Mainland policies affecting Hong Kong investors in the Mainland, Hong Kong's participation in external affairs, regional and international cooperation initiatives, as well as affording consular protection to Hong Kong residents in distress overseas.

In 2009-10, large number of specific initiatives on enhancing cooperation 2. with the Mainland will be conducted. These include for example the work of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region (HKSAR) in support of reconstruction in the Sichuan earthquake stricken areas, HKSAR's participation in the Shanghai Expo 2010 and HKSAR's preparatory work to complement the National Twelfth Five-year Plan. We do not have a separate breakdown of the related expenses.

2. Of the seven United Nations human rights treaties that are applied to Hong Kong and entail a reporting requirement, CMAB is responsible for coordinating the reporting requirements of five of them, namely the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, the International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights, the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination, the Convention on the Rights of the Child and the Convention Against Torture and Other Cruel, Inhuman or Degrading Treatment or Punishment. The Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB) is responsible for the overall coordination of the Government's participation in the Pan-Pearl River Delta (PPRD) regional cooperation, including efforts to encourage Hong Kong invested factories to restructure, upgrade and relocate to PPRD provinces.

- 2. In 2008-09, the Hong Kong Economic and Trade Offices in the Mainland have rendered support to the Commerce and Economic Development Bureau in maintaining close liaison with the trade and Mainland authorities at various levels to assist the trade to meet the changes in Mainland's processing trade policy. Specific work in this regard includes:
  - reflecting the trade's views and making recommendations to the Mainland authorities especially before the promulgation of new policies and legislation wherever such is possible;
  - through the Task Force to Support the Processing Trade, exploring with the trade measures to cope with the relevant adjustments;
  - cooperating with the Guangdong Province, through the Hong Kong/Guangdong Expert Group on the Restructuring and Upgrading of the Processing Trade, to assist Hong Kong enterprises to restructure and/or upgrade;

- organising symposiums and seminars to enhance the understanding of the trade on new policies and legislation;
- organising trade delegations to visit the Mainland with a view to encouraging Hong Kong enterprises to relocate their operations and to explore new markets;
- through the "SME Funding Schemes", assisting SMEs to acquire equipment to upgrade their operational and technical skills, and to restructure or relocate. Hong Kong enterprises may also apply for the "Innovation and Technology Fund" to improve their technological level, and to introduce more innovative concepts to their businesses; and

The four regional support service centres for ethnic minorities are expected to commence their services in 2009-10. Of the \$8 million one-off provision earmarked for the setting up of the centres, up to \$3.5 million is reserved for the centre providing telephone interpretation service and other support services, and up to \$1.5 million is reserved for each of the other three centres. The one-off provision would cover items such as fitting out of the premises, purchase of office equipment, installation of facilities required for the provision of services and manpower for pre-service training and preparation. Of the \$8 million, we have included a provision of \$3 million in the 2008-09 revised estimate as part of the setting up cost and about \$5 million in the 2009-10 estimate as the remaining part of the setting up cost.

2. We have included in the 2009-10 estimate a provision of \$16 million for funding the annual recurrent expenditure of the four centres including staff costs, rental of premises, operational expenses for organising activities and other

administrative expenditure. Of this amount, up to \$7 million is earmarked for the operating expense of the centre providing telephone interpretation service, and up to \$3 million is earmarked for each of the other three centres.

- 3. The centres will take measures to promote their services to ethnic minorities. The cost involved will form part of the recurrent costs for the operation of the centres.
- 4. We are in the process of selecting the most suitable applicants to run the centres. The actual setting up and operation expenses, and the staffing, promotion and publicity arrangements, will be dependent on the proposals of the organisations chosen to operate the centres.

#### Reply:

The estimation on the number of complaints received and handled under the Race Discrimination Ordinance (RDO) by the Equal Opportunities Commission (EOC) has been made taking into account –

- (a) the experience of the Race Relations Unit of the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau in handling similar enquiries and complaints;
- (b)EOC's operational experience that the number of discrimination complaints tends to rise gradually with the increase of the general awareness among the public on the legislation;
- (c) that complaints are expected to come mainly from members of ethnic minorities, who constitute around 5% of the total population; and
- (d) that RDO is expected to come into full operation around mid-2009, and the figures therefore represent part-year estimates.

- 2. The Operations Division of the EOC is responsible for receiving and handling complaints and conducting investigations relevant to all the discrimination ordinances in operation. There is no separate breakdown in respect of individual discrimination ordinances.
- 3. An amount of \$1.05 million has been included in the 2009-10 estimate for the EOC to launch educational and publicity projects on racial equality on a recurrent basis. According to our plans, the RDO will commence full operation around mid-2009, following the adoption of the Code of Practice on Employment and enactment of the relevant subsidiary legislation. Our intention is to review together with the EOC their requirement for additional resources to implement the RDO from that point onward. We have set aside an amount of around \$4 million to facilitate the enforcement of the RDO. However, the funding allocation to EOC is subject to the review over the next few months.
- 4. Resources required for handling matters including translation or interpretation in different ethnic minority languages will continue to be absorbed in the operational expenses of the EOC in 2009-10. No separate breakdown on resources devoted for such purpose is available.

2. For the public consultation exercise as a whole, one directorate officer at D2 level, one Senior Administrative Officer and one Administrative Officer are responsible for handling tasks relating to the public consultation exercise. These posts are part of our current establishment and the officers will undertake the public consultation exercise in addition to other duties. Furthermore, four posts comprising one Senior Executive Officer, one Executive Officer II and two Assistant Clerical Officers will be created and will assist in handling the relevant tasks starting July 2009. We will also create one Personal Secretary II post in 2009-10 to provide assistance. For budget planning purpose, we have set aside about \$5 million in 2009-10 for consulting the public on the two electoral methods for 2012.

#### Reply:

In view of the public concern over personal data leakage incidents and expectations for the Office of the Privacy Commissioner for Personal Data (PCPD) to more rigorously enforce the Personal Data (Privacy) Ordinance (PDPO), we have proposed to include in the 2009-10 estimates for the PCPD an allocation of \$5 million on a recurrent basis for the creation of four posts to stregnthen the PCPD's enforcement team and one professional post on information technology. With the increased resources, the PCPD will be able to step up proactive enforcement of the PDPO by conducting compliance checks, investigations, or inspections on the personal data systems of data users. Such checks, investigations and inspections will cover Government bureaux and departments (B/Ds) as appropriate.

2. The Government is firmly committed to the protection of personal data privacy. Each B/D has its own Data Controlling Officer who is responsible for assessing, authorising, monitoring and reviewing its own personal data protection measures. B/Ds have been reminded to observe the requirements of the PDPO and take all practicable steps to ensure that personal data held by them are protected against unauthorised or accidental access, processing, erasure or other use. In addition, we co-organised three seminars with the PCPD in 2008 to further enhance

awareness and understanding of the provisions of the PDPO within the Government.

3. Under the steer of the Office of the Government Chief Information Officer and the Security Bureau, an Information Security Enhancement Programme was launched to better protect personal and classified data and to ensure that B/Ds would comply with the security provisions of the PDPO. Thus far, a number of improvements measures have been adopted by B/Ds. These include organising activities to promote staff awareness on information security, tightening the control of work-at-home and the use of portable storage devices, enhancement of information technology facilities or resources to further enhance security on protection of data, and review of information security related regulations, policies and guidelines.

The Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB) is responsible for the overall coordination of the Government's participation in the Pan-Pearl River Delta (PPRD) regional cooperation, including efforts to encourage Hong Kong invested factories to restructure, upgrade and relocate to PPRD provinces.

2. In 2008-09, the Hong Kong Economic and Trade Offices in the Mainland have rendered support to the Commerce and Economic Development Bureau in maintaining close liaison with the trade and Mainland authorities at various levels to assist the trade to meet the changes in Mainland's processing trade policy. Specific work in this regard includes:

- reflecting the trade's views and making recommendations to the Mainland authorities especially before the promulgation of new policies and legislation wherever such is possible;
- through the Task Force to Support the Processing Trade, exploring with the trade measures to cope with the relevant adjustments;
- cooperating with the Guangdong Province, through the Hong Kong/Guangdong Expert Group on the Restructuring and Upgrading of the Processing Trade, to assist Hong Kong enterprises to restructure and/or upgrade;
- organising symposiums and seminars to enhance the understanding of the trade on new policies and legislation;
- organising trade delegations to visit the Mainland with a view to encouraging Hong Kong enterprises to relocate their operations and to explore new markets;
- through the "SME Funding Schemes", assisting SMEs to acquire equipment to upgrade their operational and technical skills, and to restructure or relocate. Hong Kong enterprises may also apply for the "Innovation and Technology Fund" to improve their technological level, and to introduce more innovative concepts to their businesses; and
- through co-organising the "<u>Transformation</u>, <u>Upgrade and Relocation to Unveil a New Horizon for Processing Trade Industry" Programme with the Hong Kong Productivity Council and joining forces with other industry support bodies such as the Hong Kong Trade Development Council, assisting Hong Kong enterprises to upgrade their technical level, restructure into foreign-invested enterprises, and develop new markets, etc.</u>

We have also launched an electronic platform for exchanging and sharing of information amongst the PPRD provinces/regions.

The Mainland Offices adopt a multi-pronged approach in representing and promoting Hong Kong's trade and commercial interests in the Mainland by organising trade missions, seminars and exhibitions for Hong Kong investors, as well as collecting and disseminating information on business information in the Mainland (including those relating to new laws and policies) to facilitate Hong Kong investors to understand the local business environment and establish their network in the Mainland. They also proactively approach Hong Kong investors and follow up issues of common concerns through appropriate channels. For example, in 2008, the Mainland Offices organised trade missions to Zhejiang, Yunnan and to the northern provinces of Heilongjiang, Jilin and Liaoning etc. to enhance mutual understanding on latest developments as well as on business opportunities. Seminars and forums were also organised on areas of interest to Hong Kong investors, including CEPA, processing trade and related policies, Mainland taxation, impact of financial tsunami to Hong Kong enterprises in the Mainland etc. Taking the opportunity of the Beijing 2008 Olympic Games, particularly our role as host to the Olympic and Paralympic Equestrian Events, exhibitions were held in 23 major trade fairs/expos/events in various Mainland cities.

2. Another major role of the Mainland Offices is to promote inward investment into Hong Kong. The Investment Promotion Divisions of the Mainland

Offices, working with Invest Hong Kong, identify potential Mainland companies in the areas that they cover; proactively approach and visit the companies identified to encourage them to invest in Hong Kong; provide free one-stop information and consultation services; and organise incoming visits and help identify and match Mainland potential investors with business partners in Hong Kong. In 2008, the Mainland Offices have facilitated visits by government officials to promote investment in Mainland cities and organised study missions for Mainland officials and enterprises to visit Hong Kong, as well as organised seminars to promote the advantages of investing in Hong Kong.

3. The Mainland Offices will continue to spare no efforts in further promoting Hong Kong's economic and trade interests in the Mainland and promoting investment in Hong Kong through the existing approach. Since the Mainland Offices cover a range of functions including liaison, public relations, economic and trade as well as investment promotion matters by adopting an integrated approach, it is not possible to quantify precisely the amount of resources and manpower to be allocated to each function. The provision earmarked for liaison, economic and trade, and investment promotion affairs under programme (3) for 2009-10 is about \$100 million.

The Government has been taking measures to promote equal opportunities and the rights of individuals through various means and channels, including education at schools, community activities, collaboration with non-government organisations and publicity activities. In 2008-09, relevant bureaux and departments as well as the Equal Opportunities Commission (EOC) have devoted resources on public education and publicity activities. Such efforts will continue in 2009-10.

2. The measures taken by the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB) include promotion and public education on children's rights, racial equality and harmony, and equal opportunities for people of different sexual orientation and transgendered persons, and sponsorship to non-government organisations to organise relevant activities. In 2008-09, the revised estimate of expenditure incurred by the CMAB on these programmes is \$12.37 million. In 2009-10, the estimated expenditure to be incurred by the CMAB on these programmes is estimated to be \$11.32 million. This figure has reflected the transfer of \$1.05 million in 2009-10 from the provision of the CMAB to the provision of the EOC for launching educational and publicity projects on racial equality as the EOC will take up this work following the implementation of the Race Discrimination Ordinance (RDO).

3. Further additional funding of around \$4 million has been set aside in 2009-10 to facilitate the enforcement of the RDO by the EOC upon the full implementation of the RDO, subject to further review with the EOC. The overall expenditure on measures to promote equal opportunities and human rights will increase in 2009-10.

After the Sichuan earthquake in May 2008, the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB) is given the responsibility to coordinate cross-bureau work and to liaise with the relevant departments in Sichuan on the support for post-quake reconstruction. On the Sichuan reconstruction work, the Legislative Council has approved a total funding of HK\$6 billion. The Hong Kong people are very keen to ensure that the relief funds will not end up in the pockets of the corrupt officials, i.e. graft in the use of public moneys at the expense of the people, so that the victims may not get the assistance they need.

Has the CMAB ever propose, on behalf of the Hong Kong side, any corruption mechanism to minimise the chances of having the relief funds being taken by corrupt officials in part or in whole? If yes, what are the details? If no, what are the reasons?

Asked by: Hon. WONG Yuk-man

#### Reply:

The HKSAR Government and the Sichuan Provincial Government both share the common objective of ensuring proper, effective and accountable use of HKSAR's reconstruction support fund. In the "HKSAR Cooperation Arrangement on Support of Restoration and Reconstruction in the Sichuan Earthquake Stricken Areas" signed by the HKSAR and Sichuan Governments on 11 October 2008, the two sides agreed on a number of important principles concerning management, monitoring and auditing of HKSAR's reconstruction projects, including:

(a) HKSAR's reconstruction support work will be implemented on a project by project basis, with well-defined project scope, technical standards, works

milestones, beneficiaries, and ceiling of HKSAR Government's financial commitment. Funds will be transferred from the Trust Fund in Support of Reconstruction in the Sichuan Earthquake Areas to the Sichuan side in instalments on the basis of the actual progress of the projects.

- (b) The technical standards for the works projects funded by the HKSAR should comply with the laws and regulation in the Mainland, with appropriate monitoring mechanism. Tendering of these projects should be conducted in accordance with the relevant Mainland laws, rules and regulations, and the level of qualification of contracting enterprises may be set at a higher level as appropriate.
- (c) The Sichuan and Hong Kong sides will jointly examine the actual progress of the projects, organise regular or irregular project inspection activities, and verify the completion of project milestones. In line with the "Government-led, full community involvement" principle, relevant volunteer professionals may also be invited to participate in the monitoring work.
- (d) The Sichuan side will also submit regular reports and related documents, including reports by an independent certification body, project programme/photos/plans, notes of meetings and records of tests as proof.
- 2. The Central Government accords great importance to the monitoring of reconstruction projects, and have promulgated a series of related laws, rules and regulations for monitoring purpose. To ensure the proper and accountable use of funds, we have invited the Independent Commission Against Corruption (ICAC) to study the project management and funding arrangements. The ICAC is in overall terms satisfied with the arrangements. It has also suggested additional measures such as the organisation of seminars to share with Sichuan officials our experience in project management and tendering. We agree with the suggestion and are following up with the Sichuan side. For instance, we arranged this month a study mission of Sichuan local officials from municipalities/counties where the HKSAR has undertaken reconstruction projects. During the study mission, sessions were organised for the ICAC, the Audit Commission, the Development Bureau and other relevant parties to brief them on Hong Kong's practice of project and financial management.
- 3. To further strengthen the project supervision framework, the Development Bureau will commission independent professional consultants with extensive experience in monitoring and checking Mainland works projects to assist in carrying out site inspections. The consultants will conduct on-site checking of the progress of works, quality and use of funds at important stages, such as construction of foundation and structures as well as the completion of project milestones, as well as vetting of documents on quality management provided by the Sichuan side.

4. We will continue to maintain close contacts with the Sichuan side to ensure proper and effective implementation of HKSAR's reconstruction support projects.

Principal Officials may also make use of these occasions to communicate with district personalities and District Council members on the major initiatives under their respective policy portfolios.

2. The expenditure involved in SCMA's visit to Sai Kung is minimal. We should also clarify that the tea reception was attended not only by the Chairman and Vice-Chairman, but also members of the Sai Kung District Council.

2. Regarding the specific activities in the concerned district visit, when visiting the secondary school, SCMA took the opportunity to better understand the work relating to the promotion of Basic Law and national education in secondary schools. Also, during his visit to the youth services centre, SCMA listened to the views of young people on issues of their concern, including opportunities for development both in Hong Kong and the Mainland. The Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau is responsible for a number of policy portfolios, including constitutional development and policy on electoral affairs, coordination of the HKSAR's relations with the Mainland (including overseeing the operation of the HKSAR's offices in the Mainland), and matters relating to human rights and access to information. The Bureau has been working on these areas in a steadfast manner, and has been making progress. In 2009-10, the Bureau will take on a number of important tasks, including coordinating efforts in support of Sichuan reconstruction, coordinating the preparatory work for Hong Kong's participation in the Shanghai Expo 2010, conducting public consultation on prisoners' rights to vote and enacting necessary legislation, enhancing exchanges and cooperation with Taiwan, and conducting public consultation in the fourth quarter of 2009 on the 2012 Chief Executive and Legislative Council electoral methods.

2. The position of Political Assistant is responsible principally for providing political support and input to the Secretary and the Under Secretary, and conducting the necessary political liaison at the instruction of the Secretary and the Under Secretary. At present, the position of Political Assistant to Secretary for Constitutional and Mainland Affairs has yet to be filled. Similar to the filling of other outstanding positions of Under Secretaries and Political Assistants, our consistent position is that, if there are suitable candidates, such positions will be filled. #### Reply:

Immigration Divisions are set up under the Beijing Office (BJO) and Guangdong Economic and Trade Office (GDETO) and are tasked, among other duties, to provide practicable assistance to Hong Kong residents in distress. There are five Immigration Officer posts in BJO (supported by five local staff) and four in GDETO (supported by one local staff). The expenditure of the Immigration Divisions of BJO and GDETO is set out below:

2. Assistance rendered by the Immigration Divisions of BJO and GDETO usually covers the following scenarios:

- (a) Loss of travel documents or monies: Verifying the identity of the concerned Hong Kong residents who have lost their travel documents and facilitating their early return to Hong Kong. The Divisions will also contact the family of the concerned Hong Kong residents where necessary.
- (b) Accidents, injuries and decease cases: Providing practicable assistance to the concerned assistance seekers and their families, including:
  - (i) notifying, as soon as possible, relatives of the parties concerned;
  - (ii) contacting family/travel agencies to arrange for the early return of the injured persons to Hong Kong for treatment;
  - (iii) facilitating the entry of the injured persons at control points back to Hong Kong;
  - (iv) if medical treatment is required in the Mainland, and where practicable, providing information on medical services available for reference; and
  - (v) assisting family members of the deceased in completing the application procedures for death certificates and for transporting the bodies back to Hong Kong.
- (c) **Arrest or Detention**: The Divisions will gather details of the case from the assistance seekers (usually family members of the concerned Hong Kong resident) and explain to them the relevant Mainland laws, regulations and procedures for criminal cases under different stages of investigation, prosecution, trial or imprisonment, etc. They will also advise the assistance seekers that they may appoint Mainland lawyers as their legal representatives. Where required, the Divisions can provide the assistance seekers with the relevant contact details of law societies in the concerned provinces/region under its coverage, so that the assistance seekers may consider seeking appropriate legal representation. At the request of the assistance seekers, the Divisions will pass on and reflect their views and requests to the relevant Mainland authorities and provide them with relevant information for reference (e.g. the rights and obligations of a person under detention) according to the development of the case.
- 3. The number of cases handled by BJO and GDETO for the past two years is set out below:

  - continue to oversee compliance with the reporting requirements under the relevant human rights treaties which apply to Hong Kong, and coordinate attendance of the Government to meetings of the corresponding treaty monitoring bodies (including the hearing of the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination in August 2009);
  - continue to promote racial harmony, including the compilation of administrative guidelines to promote racial equality, and overseeing the establishment and operation of four regional support service centres for ethnic minorities;
  - continue to promote other human rights including rights of children and equal opportunities for people of different sexual orientation and transgendered persons through various publicity and educational measures;

- consult the public on the findings of the review of the Personal Data (Privacy) Ordinance; and
- consider how the relevant parties could be consulted on the recommendation of the Law Reform Commission on stalking.

As the tasks above are an integral part of the work of the Bureau, there is no separate breakdown on the staffing arrangements for these tasks.

(b) The effectiveness of the work of the Government in protecting human rights is continually and closely monitored by the Legislative Council and the public, including the media. We also report to international human right treaties bodies regularly on the human rights situation in Hong Kong. In addition, we maintain close liaison with stakeholders through established channels such as the different forums to seek their views and comments on the human rights situation in Hong Kong. We will continue to maintain dialogue with the stakeholders concerned and monitor the situation closely.

Reply:

We are fully committed to the implementation of the Race Discrimination Ordinance (RDO). An amount of \$1.05 million has been included in the 2009-10 estimate for the Equal Opportunities Commission (EOC) to launch educational and publicity projects on racial equality on a recurrent basis. According to our plans, the RDO will commence full operation around mid-2009, following the adoption of the Code of Practice on Employment and enactment of the relevant subsidiary legislation. Our intention is to review together with the EOC their requirement for additional resources to implement the RDO from that point onward. We have set aside an amount of around \$4 million to facilitate the enforcement of the RDO. However, the funding allocation to EOC is subject to the review over the next few months.

2. In 2008-09, there was a one-off provision of \$1 million for publicity and promotion of equal opportunities especially in the light of the race discrimination

legislation, and a capital subvention of \$0.48 million for the production of training materials which was completed in 2008-09. Since these amounts are for 2008-09 only, and the 2009-10 estimate for the EOC has not yet taken into account the additional funding to be allocated for enforcement for the RDO, the 2009-10 estimate is slightly lower than the 2008-09 revised estimate.

#### Reply:

With the appointment of Under Secretaries and Political Assistants, the relevant bureaux / offices need to incur, apart from the remuneration of these officials, the following additional expenditure:

- (a) MPF contribution by the Government as employer: The Government's contribution amounts to \$12,000 per annum for each politically appointed official; and
- (b) one Senior Personal Secretary to support each Under Secretary: The post of Senior Personal Secretary is at a notional annual salary cost at mid-point of \$402,240.

Departmental transport for Under Secretaries and secretarial support for Political Assistants are provided from within resources currently available to the relevant bureaux / offices.

2. The provisions for the remuneration of the politically appointed officials and the departmental expenses incurred by them are included in the annual Estimates in the same way as other similar expenses of the relevant bureaux or

offices. The use of such resources is subject to the same financial rules and procedures applicable to government expenditure in general.

- 3. As regards overseas official visits, such visits by politically appointed officials are subject to operational need, as in the case of civil servants. Examples of such visits include the visit of the Under Secretary for Commerce and Economic Development to Davos, Switzerland, in late January 2009 to take part in an informal ministerial meeting on the Doha Round of multilateral trade negotiations under the World Trade Organization; and the visit of the Under Secretary for Constitutional and Mainland Affairs to Geneva, Switzerland, in early February 2009 to attend the hearing by the United Nations Human Rights Council on the HKSAR's report with regard to the promotion and protection of human rights. The expenses relating to these overseas official visits count towards the general departmental expenses of the bureaux / offices concerned.
- 4. As regards lobbying, politically appointed officials need to lobby political parties / groups and Legislative Council (LegCo) Members in dealing with policy and legislative issues from time to time. Assessing the need for such lobbying and conducting the actual lobbying are part of their jobs. This helps Government secure support of political parties / groups and LegCo Members to its policies and takes into account their ideas and input in the process of policy formulation and implementation. If any expenses are incurred in the performance of this duty, they are subject to the same financial rules and procedures applicable to the expenditure concerned.

We are fully committed to the implementation of the Race Discrimination Ordinance (RDO). An amount of \$1.05 million has been included in the 2009-10 estimate for the Equal Opportunities Commission (EOC) to launch educational and publicity projects on racial equality on a recurrent basis. According to our plans, the RDO will commence full operation around mid-2009, following the adoption of the Code of Practice on Employment and enactment of the relevant subsidiary legislation. Our intention is to review together with the EOC their requirement for additional resources to implement the RDO from that point onward. We have set aside an amount of around \$4 million to facilitate the enforcement of the RDO. However, the funding allocation to EOC is subject to the review over the next few months.

#### Reply:

The Government is firmly committed to the protection of personal data privacy and will strive to provide resources at an appropriate level to support the Office of the Privacy Commissioner for Personal Data (PCPD) in the effective enforcement of the Personal Data (Privacy) Ordinance (PDPO).

- 2. The revised financial provision for the PCPD in 2008-09 amounted to \$42.9 million, representing an increase of 18.5% over the 2007-08 provision. Of this increase, \$1.4 million was to cater for pay rise whereas the rest was to enhance the protection of personal data privacy, which comprised:
  - (a) \$1.8 million was for the creation of three posts on a recurrent basis for strengthening the enforcement team of the PCPD;
  - (b) an additional one-off allocation of \$2.4 million was provided to further strengthen PCPD's enforcement team on work to promote compliance with the requirements of the PDPO, following an in-year review of the resource requirements of the PCPD; and

- (c) \$1 million was provided on a one-off basis for stepping up the promotion and educational work to promote public awareness on protection of personal data.
- 3. For 2009-10, the proposed financial provision for the PCPD is \$44.5 million, an all-time high since the establishment of the PCPD in December 1996. The amount includes \$5 million to be allocated to the PCPD on a recurrent basis from 2009-10 onwards for the creation of four posts in PCPD's enforcement team to step up self-initiated enforcement actions, and one post to render professional support on information technology front in the enforcement of the PDPO.

Immigration Divisions are set up under the Beijing Office (BJO) and Guangdong Economic and Trade Office (GDETO) and are tasked, among other duties, to provide practicable assistance to Hong Kong residents in distress. In handling requests for assistance from Hong Kong residents under detention in the Mainland, the Divisions will gather details of the case from the assistance seekers (usually family members of the concerned Hong Kong resident) and explain to them the relevant Mainland laws, regulations and procedures for criminal cases under different stages of investigation, prosecution, trial or imprisonment, etc. At the request of the assistance seekers, the Divisions will pass on and reflect their views and requests to the relevant Mainland authorities and provide them with relevant information for reference (e.g. the rights and obligations of a person under detention) according to the development of the case. For those who claim to be out of money, the Divisions would, upon their request, contact their families in Hong Kong for financial assistance.

2. The Divisions will advise the assistance seekers that they may appoint Mainland lawyers as their legal representatives. Where required, the Divisions can provide the assistance seekers with the relevant contact details of law societies in the concerned provinces/region under its coverage, so that the assistance seekers may consider seeking appropriate legal representation.

According to the High Court judgment in respect of three judicial review cases relating to the right of prisoners to be registered as electors and the voting right of prisoners and remanded unconvicted persons, the constitutional right to vote of remanded unconvicted persons is not affected by any law. In view of the judgment, the Registration and Electoral Office will make interim arrangements within the existing legislative framework to facilitate remanded unconvicted persons who are registered electors of the relevant constituencies to vote in all forthcoming by-elections which may be held in the interim. Since there is no ordinary or general elections in 2009-10, any resources required for enabling the remanded unconvicted persons to vote in any by-elections are expected to be minimal and can be absorbed within the existing allocation. We are also working on amendments to the subsidiary legislation on electoral procedures to introduce long-term arrangements to facilitate voting by remanded unconvicted persons.

- (c) the other types of expense to be included in "election expenses" apart from the expenses for conducting elections?

#### Reply:

The provision of \$23.16 million under "Election Expenses" is made up of a sum of \$18 million earmarked for the conduct of Legislative Council and District Council by-elections to be held if and when a vacancy arises, and \$5.16 million earmarked for the publicity of the 2009 Voter Registration Campaign and the annual updating of voter registers.

2. The expenditure of by-elections could vary significantly depending on the size of the electorate, the number of candidates, the voter turnout rate, etc. of the by-election concerned. It is therefore difficult to estimate the expenditure and the breakdown of each by-election. It is also not possible to foresee the number of by-elections to be conducted. In line with the established practice, we have provided for a lump sum amount in the estimate to cater for the possible need to conduct by-elections.

Reply:

- (a) A design-and-build contract was awarded in December 2008 for the Hong Kong Pavilion in World Exposition 2010 Shanghai. Design development and site preparation works are in progress. Construction commencement is targeted for May 2009.
- (b) The Architectural Services Department's management and project team has been reinforced with extra architectural and building services support to work closely with the design-and-build contractor and co-ordination meetings with the Shanghai Expo Bureau are held to facilitate smooth progress for both design submissions and site works. In conjunction with Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau, the team will closely oversee the progress of the Hong Kong Pavilion.
