Subject:Consultation on the Political Appointment system

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Dear Sir

I believe that the last thing that Hong Kong needs is a further political layer of bureaucracy. This will stultify the already inert administration and render it even less responsive to public concerns. This sound contradictory but opinion towards "politicians" in HK is correctly skeptical. The evidence so far on the main political parties is that most have not represented grass root opinion (on many issues, such as harbour reclamation, the Star Ferry/Queen's Pier closure, air pollution, buildings, education etc) and instead spend their time pondering how to please and pandaring to Beijing. It is only the smaller parties in HK that have done anything positive that has a real local and international developmental effect.

If there was a true democratic system in Hong Kong, then paid "civil servant" political appointments would be totally unnecessary. Political advisers exist elsewhere but they are subject to public election via their political masters.

As it is, the public I have spoken to see this as an expensive window-dressing exercise at best, and an interference with clean and uncorrupt administration at worst. The HKSAR civil service may be bloated and inefficient but at least it is deemed to be largely non-corrupt. In my opinion, the introduction of political appointees will remove the current political neutrality of the Civil Service, not enhance it as the consultation document attempts to suggest. It will also undermine morale in the Civil Service as a number of commentators have pointed out.

A side issue is that, by and large, the rest of the world thinks the last thing that anywhere is short of is politicians!
